SPRING FEVER

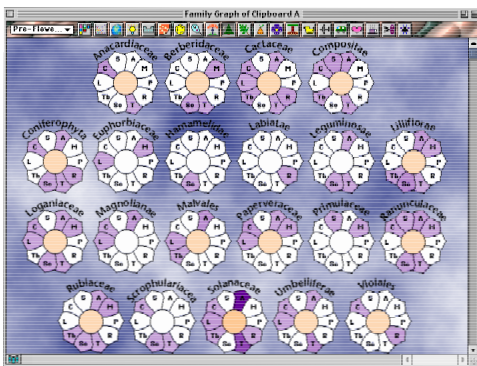

FREE UPDATES

This month we will make available updates to ReferenceWorks and MacRepertory. Besides a number of good bug fixes there are quite a few new features.

ReferenceWorks 3.1

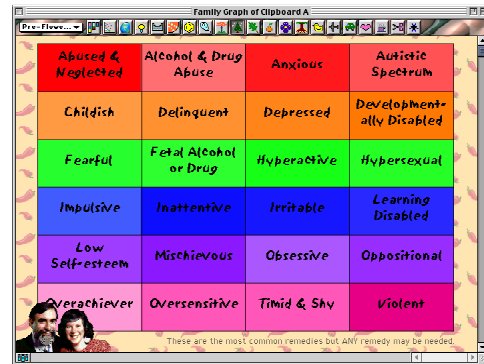
There are four new family graphs.



Rajan's Plant Miasms crosses each plant family with each miasm; each petal is represents the remedies for each miasm for the family. At a click see what sunflowers are sycotic (Erig, Gnaph, Mill, Sanic and Senec)!



Rajan's Plants displays the plant families with the main characteristics, at a glance, that Rajan feels are central.



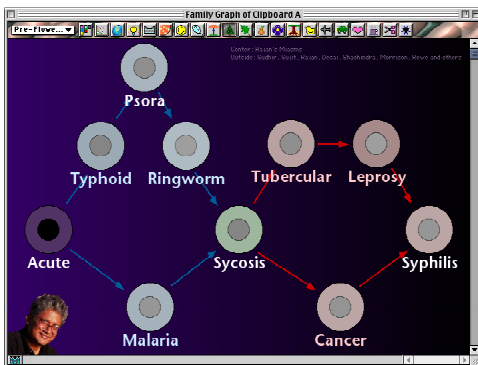
Bob & Judyth's Kids suggest the most common remedies for kids who are overachievers, have attention problems, etc.



Pitcairn's Groups gives major groups of acute, anti-psoric and miasmatic remedies.

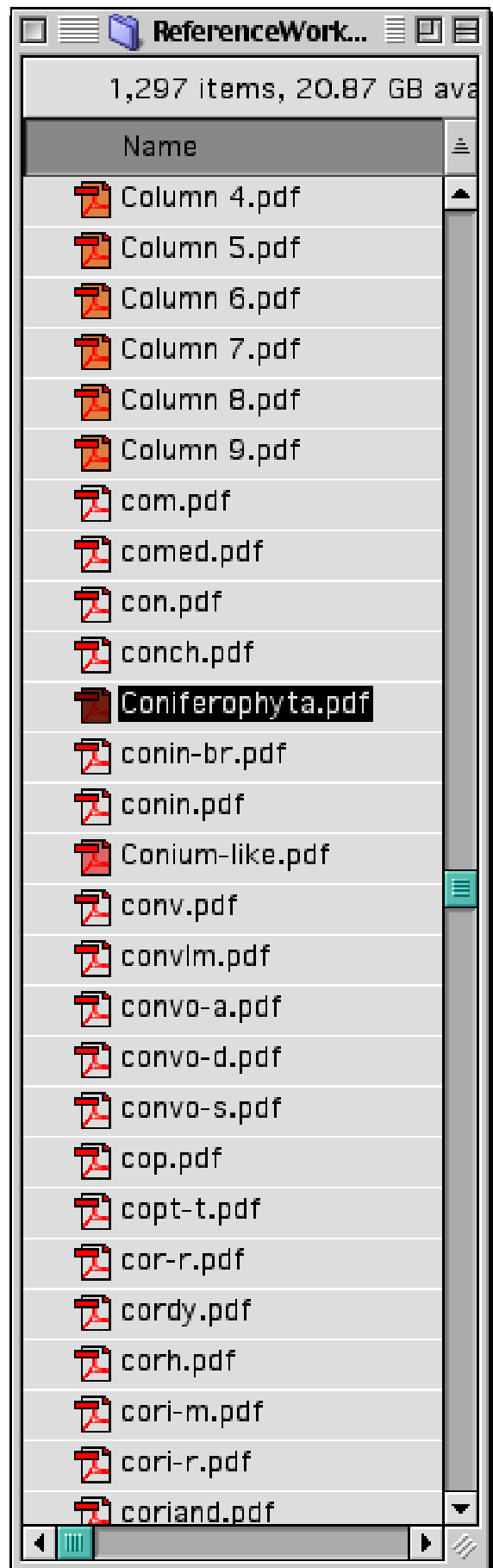


You'll find these graphs by opening the Family Graph (the Spiral Graph icon) and selecting Design Graphs from the Graph menu and clicking on the icon with the question mark.



We have expanded Rajan's Miasms to separate remedies that Rajan is confident of and those suggested by colleagues for each miasm.

There are 425 new pdf's for remedies and families bringing the total of pdfs to 1297! The pdfs give primary information about a specific remedy or family (botanical info, suggestions from homeopaths, mythology, who made the first proving, etc.). Often they include pictures. To see the pdfs you control/click (Macintosh) or right click (Windows) on the remedy or family's name almost anywhere in ReferenceWorks; you'll be shown a popdown menu, select "Get Info". Or you can open them directly by opening the ReferenceWorks Folder, then ReferenceWorks Files folder and finally the ReferenceWorks Info folder. There are a few I'd suggest you look at as samples of what you have: Coniferophyta.pdf (a slide show I did on conifers), Row F.pdf (Divya's cycles of the sixth row of the periodic table), Phenols.pdf (a sample of Roger Morrison's info about the organic compounds) and squil.pdf (a fairly typical example of remedy info).



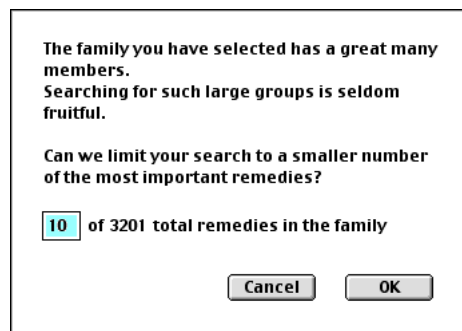
MacRepertory 6.1

You can now set the size and font for an entire keynote file with one step. Open a keynote, select some text in any remedy, while holding the option (mac) or alt (PC) key down, select the Edit menu and either "Font All" or "Size All". All remedies will be changed to this size.



Have you ever wanted to paste a rubric that you exported from ReferenceWorks directly into the repertory? In this version you can! To export a rubric: after you search in ReferenceWorks press command-e (mac) or control-e (pc), switch to MacRepertory select the rubric you want to paste after and select "Paste" from the Edit menu - voila! Because it is necessary to re-index after making changes we suggest that you paste into a copy of your favorite repertory and after some weeks switch to the enhanced repertory, re-index, duplicate the repertory and make your changes to the copy and so on.

Often when searching for the central themes of a family or displaying the Concept graph for a family you want to only see the most common members of the family. We have altered the families so that when you select one and all of its members are put in the window they are inserted in the order of their frequency in the repertory (the most common first); just delete the remedies from the end.

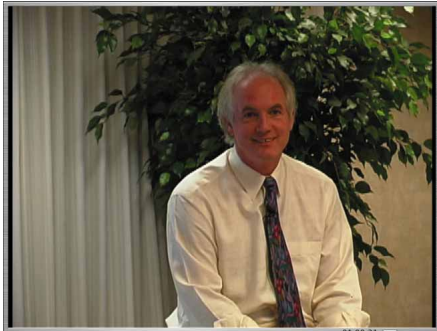


Getting your copy of the updates

The updates are free if you download them from our site or \$35 each if mailed on CD. As soon as they are ready, we'll announce the website address via email along with the necessary password. So make sure that we have your current email address!

DVD TRAININGS

"On February seventh in Marin, David Warkentin took a day to teach his favorite features of MacRepertory and ReferenceWorks. We captured it on video and have transferred it to DVD so that you can now have this great seminar in your own home and at your pace.



We've broken the training into two DVD's: MacRepertory, 148 minutes, starts with a wonderful discussion and step-by-step demonstration of a new concept in selecting rubrics and analyzing; this discussion will dramatically improve your prescribing and confidence! David slowly walks through using the repertory and the Theme Palette. Other segments include discovering the central themes of a family, the Concept and Family graphs. ReferenceWorks, 102 minutes, slowly examines how to craft a search phrase so you always find exactly what you want. From there David goes on to show tricks to focus your results, using contextual menus to get more information, and drop and dragging. The last section explores the different ways that MacRepertory and ReferenceWorks can now talk to one another.

Each DVD lasts about three hours and is \$40. We hope to have copies for sale on May 1.

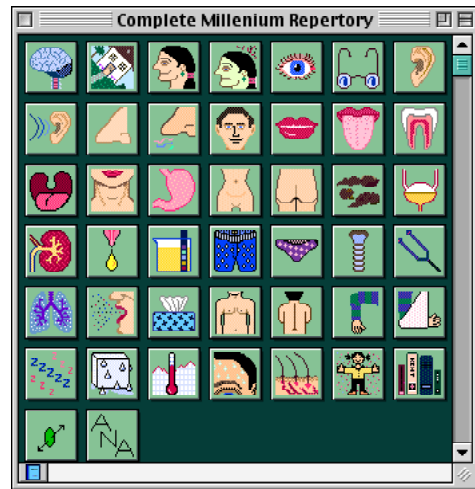
MACREP TRICKS

A subtle but sometimes profound shift in your relationship with a program can come about when you customize it to look a way you feel comfortable with. There are many hidden tricks that you can use to make MacRepertory fit as well as your favorite clothes...

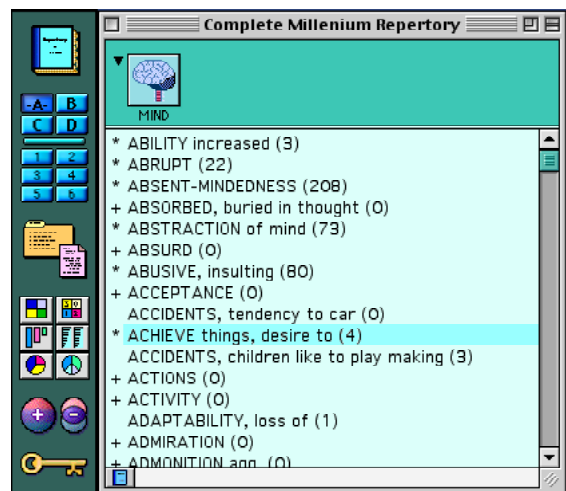
All Windows: hold down the command (mac) or control (pc) key as you click in the window's background. Especially setting the backgrounds that are normally white to light pastels can be very pretty indeed. In some of the windows, like the Rubrics' Clipboard you have to click at the very left edge of the background.

Don't like the change? To revert back to the defaults hold down option/command (mac) or alt/control (pc) as you click in the back ground. Or if you make a total hash of it all simply throw out the "MacRepertory 6 Settings" file and it will be rebuilt as good as new.

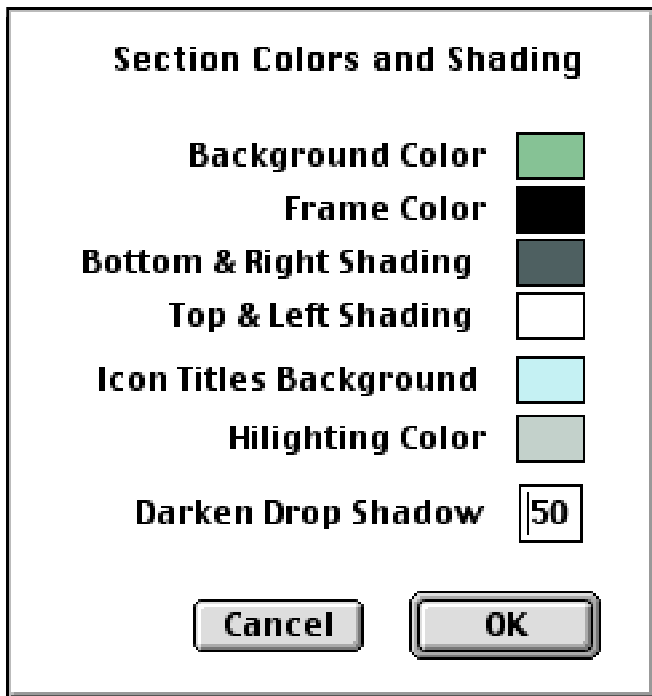
Repertory Window (icon view): the background, shading, etc for the icons can be set. Holding down shift/command (mac) or shift/control (pc) click on the background.

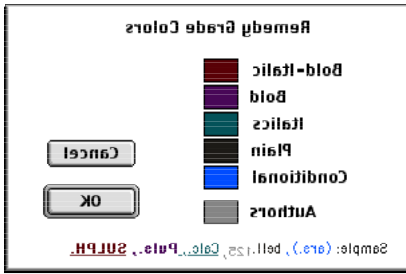


Repertory Window (open): There has several areas that can be changed.

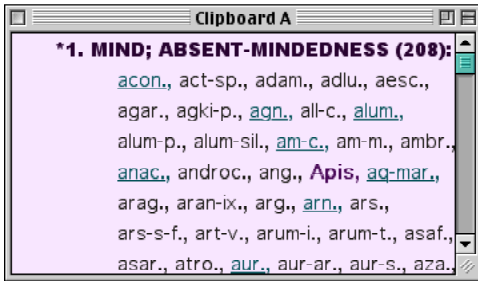


Rubrics' Clipboards: Here, and in the repertory, you can alter how the rubrics look. With the window open go to the Edit menu and change the font or size or color. One font I sometimes use is Arial Black; there is a nice contrast between the remedies and the rubric. You can change the color of each different remedy grade; go to the File menu, Preferences. Select Grade Color.





Click in each color's square to set the color.



Icon Palette: Using MacRepertory and ReferenceWorks together is far easier if you have the two icon palettes in different areas of the screen. To move the Icon Palette hold down the option key as you drag it. (Mac)

RW TRICKS

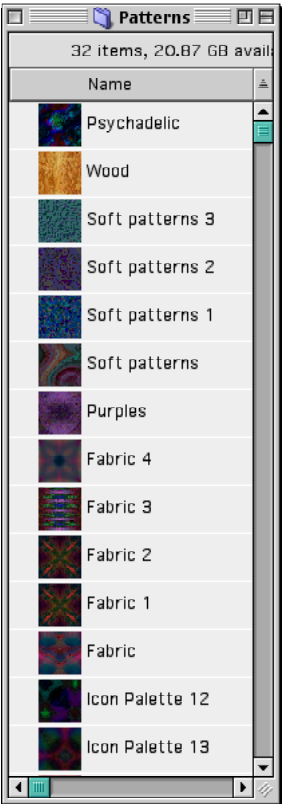
Icon Palette: Like MacRepertory hold down the command (mac) or control (pc) key as you click in the background.

References, Materia Medica, Remedy Graph and Family Graph Windows: command (mac) or control (pc) click in the band at the top (where the information is displayed).

Fonts: To change the font of any window, open it and select Font or Size from the Edit menu. The program will remember your selection from session to session.

Pattern Backgrounds: Ah, here's a trick no one knows! There are files that can set the backgrounds of the ReferenceWorks' windows to patterns. Once you have installed the update open the ReferenceWorks Files folder inside the ReferenceWorks Folder, you'll see a folder called "Patterns"; drag any of these files into the ReferenceWorks Appearances folder and start ReferenceWorks. See how you now have patterns everywhere? I particularly like "Fabric".

To stop using the patterns just drag the file out of the ReferenceWorks Appearances folder.



COMPANY NEWS

OS X

The last six months we've worked hard transferring our programs to run natively on Macintosh's System X. We had hoped that the process would be easier but it has turned out that we have had to switch to a different compiler and make tens of thousands of changes. All of this work has cost more than \$100,000 so far! We plan to have the new versions ready to ship in July or August and expect that they will cost around \$85 for the upgrades. One particular area which Jayesh emphasizes is learning from failures. More than twenty years ago, when he and Rajan Sankaran began collaborating, their inspiration came from the realization that there is a potential treasure trove of knowledge available to the practitioner who is willing to delve into failed cases. In the spirit of continuing this important work Jayesh was keen upon the idea of treating a limited number of live patients throughout the different courses. Patients have been selected who are still seriously seeking curative treatment through homeopathy, despite having not yet been helped.

These patients will be followed throughout the entirety of the course. In the past series in Berkeley, Boston and New York City, these live cases proved to be a terrific catalyst for the course participants in working and developing as a group alongside Jayesh. Each patient was seen at each session throughout the course's entirety. In spite of the degree of difficulty of these cases, yet due to an attitude of relentless diligence exemplified at all times by Jayesh, the vast majority of these patients got enormous, often life-changing results.

Similarly, the "model cases" Jayesh brings from his practice to share with us are most often cases where he had struggled and failed repeatedly before finally succeeding. He refers to those as his landmark cases. He emphasized that these are the most meaningful cases in a homeopath's career, for they clearly and compellingly illustrate one or more of the crucial aspects of homeopathic practice. Taking us into the innermost reaches of his thought process and experience, Jayesh generously and freely shares how to grapple with the challenges and difficulties of everyday practice. SARAJEVO

(As all of you know and must realize, this story is going to be repeated in Iraq. Please help Dina and her clinic in Sarajevo. I wish that the conditions will be right for another homeopath (or two!) to pick the same idea of a clinic and put together for Iraq. LG)

Dina: A Homeopath and her Clinic in Sarajevo

Background of the Bosnian War and its effects upon the Post War Years

Between 1991 and 1995, Bosnia was entrenched in a violent war with neighboring Serbia and Croatia. These two regions developed a strategy to gain Bosnian territory and to annihilate Bosnian Muslims and any one, be they Serb, Croat,

Jew, or Romani, who resisted Serbian and Croatian demands. Many cities were destroyed, mass torture and rape became common. Citizens were trapped in villages and cities in their basements or flats for three and half years while mortar shells hit their homes day and night. Many families hid in the forests or fled from village to village. Hundreds of thousands were imprisoned in concentration camps.

Communities were virtually without decent food and often no food. It was a rare occasion, perhaps once a year, for a family of five to share an egg or an onion. There was no heat, no electricity, no running water, shattered windows, save for the lucky who had 1mm of plastic on the windows, and so there was no privacy for the duration of the war. To go to springs to fetch water became a dangerous journey as citizens were shot while standing in line, as were children on their way to school, or mourners while burying their dead.

Greta Feruic, a survivor of Auschwitz, who chose to remain in Sarajevo during the Bosnian War once confided, "Sarajevo made Auschwitz seem like a party." For three and half years the international community permitted this war on East European soil and by the time the US and Europe intervened Bosnia was a waste land. The Dayton Accord, established through the intervention of the US, actually made the Serbians victors, giving over fifty five percent of Bosnian territories to Bosnian Serbs, who remain aligned with Serbia and nationalist policy. This guaranteed a partitioned country and excessive difficulties if forging a unified government, which still has to be accomplished. And hence many obstacles remain in rebuilding the country.

Many of the most educated and skilled citizens fled the country causing a massive drain of human resources. Many illiterate village people moved into the cities, including Sarajevo, which now has only 50,000 of the original 500,000 residents. This has increased discord and lack of co-operation. Tolerance which was the by word of Sarajevo before the war has given way to intolerance and nationalist sentiment.

Seven years since the war, there remains no unified governmental rule, no stable economic programs, no unified educational plan, no rule of law. Unemployment is about 60%. Those who are employed receive approximately 300 to 500 KM or about \$250 a month. This salary may have to serve an extended family. Many people earn even less than this. And some fortunate members employed by the international community or by international business earn about \$1000. A month, but this population is proportionately small. To give an example a university professor receives \$250 a month. An archeologist \$200 a month. A hotel worker about \$250 a month. Doctors about \$300 a month. Municipal workers about \$750 a month. Many families live on pension of about \$50 to \$80 a month. None of these, save for those employed by international agencies, are true living wages and all struggle.

Once dignified professors now look through rubbish bins, old women and men beg on the streets. The mean age of employment is 35 and most middle age people those forty and above are usually not hired. The international Mafia control the borders with illicit border transactions such as the trafficking of women and body parts, coming from Eastern Europe, Russia and the Middle East. Whole human cargoes of individuals and families promised democracy in the west and who pay dearly for it, are drowned in Bosnian rivers. The municipalities and Cantons pocket a degree of all international funds. This is an improvement for after the war 70% of international aid went into the bank accounts of governmental officials.

Victims of War and Torture

The population of Bosnia whether they were victims of torture or of the consequences of war are, generally traumatized., with exceptions of those who left at the beginning of the war and returned after the war. There were 250,000 women, children and men who were victims of torture and rape. Many women were raped over a hundred times, some with their breasts cut or removed. Individuals had limbs amputated by scythes, men were crucified to mosque doors.

Of the 250,000 victims of torture perhaps ten thousand have received some kind of treatment. In one group, the Association of Concentration Camp Inmates of Canton Sarajevo with a membership ship of 6,000 about one hundred have been treated psychologically and perhaps several hundred more physically.

Many doctors, psychologists, social workers are themselves traumatized and often refuse to recognize or work with their own trauma. Often they do not have necessary supportive resources to begin their own healing journey. One reason is existential, a fear they will lose their positions if their vulnerability is exposed. Therefore these practitioners are limited in their own healing and in supporting their traumatized patients. Often their methods of treatment are inadequate.

Some of the best work in the healing of trauma has occurred in Women's Centers, such as MEDICA in Zenica and in Kozarac with Through Heart to Peace. Often women work instinctively, even those without training, to help bring traumatized individuals back to themselves.

Even with the best of professional treatment as happens in certain especially fine integrative programs such as the Sarajevo Center for the Treatment of Victims of Torture, founded by the exemplary psychiatrist Sabina Popvi. Many of those treated still display psychotic symptoms. In general, during the post war years many more individuals express traumatic symptoms which had not yet surfaced at the end of the Bosnian War. Too, with ongoing unemployment, and untreated traumatized individuals domestic violence and child abuse has dramatically increased.

Clinics such as Dr. Popovic's are limited in their outreach, since 1996 the Center for the Treatment of Torture Victims treated 600 patients in a comprehensive program based on programs founded in Denmark and Berlin. Programs such as the German program, Wings of Hope, which work in the schools with traumatized children have an relatively excellent success rate, but they must employ a large staff including as psychologist, teachers, athletes, music therapists, artists etc. The financial feasibility of programs like these are limited. And even Wings of Hope have reached a plateau of success in healing, they cannot yet move beyond.

More and more funding is being withdrawn from Bosnia, The UN Mission to Bosnia and Herzegovina is leaving at the end of December. Though some UN offices will remain open such as the UN High Commission for Refugees, or UNICEF. Other agencies are closing their doors.

Therapeutic care was considered a priority during the first post war years, it has lost its position and now focus is on economic programs and the return of refugees to their home towns often where their assailants live on the same street.

The spiritual life of this country is suffering and has been at risk. With no sense of a future, its citizens have become apathetic, depressed, with increasing incidence of suicide and random violence. Individuals and families because of their economic desperation, animosities, and unhealed wounds are easily influenced by nationalist groups who offer stipends for membership in their movement, erasing any vestiges of free will and independent motivation.

Sarajevo: an Opium City

As in many besieged cities and villages, a great proportion of the population needed to create alternative psychological realities in order to survive. While they physically and emotionally endured continuous threat, their minds sought ways to numb or deny their deeper emotional responses.

Crying often became inhibited, and at times it was seen as humiliation or even as an act of selfishness or cowardliness to show extreme grief in public or even in families, as all members of society suffered. So suffering became internalized. One had to be brave all the time. What this produced was a false sense of immunity to emotional and sometimes physical pain. Instincts often became corrupted and individuals would bravely, or foolishly, walk right to the sight of a grenade explosion, rather than turn away, which would be a proper instinctual response. Many began to live in a dream like state, creating a stupor or trance which keeps fear and emotional or physical discomfort at a distance.

In Sarajevo, in a single day, it was not unusual to witness the death of thirty people just feet away, children dissolving in mid air, and within the hour celebrate the wedding of a couple, each with amputated legs from a landmine accident. These were the extremes every citizen experienced. Living between surrealistic realities and struggling daily to assure one's own survival.

Most people developed deep seated sleep disturbances, as mortar attacks came day after day and sometime there would be lulls, so as nerves settled, suddenly there occurred another round of fire. At any moment, a Chetnik soldiers might break down doors and kill and torture the inhabitants of a home. Fear was continuously present.

Opium as a dominating theme was particularly noticed by one Bosnian homeopath who first needed to recognize her own Opium profile in order to recognize it in others. Compared to other remedies, there is little written about Opium and, yet, it is a major remedy for consideration in post war treatment.

Opium is one prevalent profile, but many others exist as individuals endure chronic pain, as well as the absence of pain where pain should exist, from infestation of shrapnel and loss of limbs, suffer from bronchial infections, deterioration of nerves, heart disease and stomach and breast cancer at much higher rates than in western countries. Fear is a common companion. Many have developed symptoms from years of starvation and contaminated food donated by the international community when they gave food from storage facilities, including rations of meat used in the Vietnam War.

In addition, landmines remain all through the mountains. Since 1996 only 40,000 have been removed because of lack of standards and ethical behavior amongst landmine removal groups. This leaves several million landmines in place and accidents which maim and kill, occurring monthly throughout Bosnia.

And so Bosnians must limit their movements in nature and much agricultural land cannot be used. Before the war, organic gardening was prevalent, now crops are infused with insecticides and aluminum silicate imported from Herzegovina and from Turkey and Northern Africa. The elder population often say, "Our food is now poison."

Contaminated water has resulted from US recycled plutonium bomb casings, littering land and rivers.

Homeopathy Arrives in Bosnia

Five years ago, Homeopathy came to Bosnia with Homeopaths Without Borders, when The London International School for Classical Homeopathy conducted two generations of trainings in Sarajevo. Two years ago, a Dutch branch of Homeopaths Without Borders began trainings in the City of Tuzla.

From the two generations of intensive two year trainings conducted by The London International School for Classical Homeopathy there were forty graduates. Of these forty, only six or seven practice full time, a few practice part time. And most do not practice at all, having neither a sense of competence, physical space for practice, or financial resources to begin private practice. Motivated graduates attend post graduate seminars in Split and in Belgrade, and now in Tuzla and Sarajevo.

Those homeopaths who have endured and who are available to practice full time, live at the most basic minimum of existence for they are not lucky enough, or young enough, to find other employment. Plus, all who are practicing wish to dedicated themselves to homeopathy and its growth in this country.

It takes great dedication and perseverance to begin private practice here. One reason is that Bosnians must be still be educated to homeopathy, another reason is that Bosnians have lost will and discipline and often give up when treatment is just beginning, and the thirds is that they have no money for treatment and, remedies. Remnants of Titoism have not psychologically prepared citizens to take financial responsibility for medical treatment, even though socialized medicine has not existed in over ten years..

It will take time to place homeopathy into law in Bosnia, while finding a balance between the needs of lay and physician homeopaths, as it is everywhere. But, the larger problem in placing homeopathy into law, is that there is nearly no rule of law for almost anything, and no way of a carrying out public policy. Police and judicial systems are virtually corrupted. None the less, Homeopaths are working for inclusion into the law within the next few years.

A Special Clinic and a Special Homeopath: Their Survival is Crucial

In the central part of the Sarajevo, near the well known main street, Marala Tita, is a homeopathic clinic began by the senior teacher from the London School for Classical Homeopathy, Marion Howie, and some of her students. One student of Marion's who is now a practicing homeopath, Dina Manko, became the clinic's organizer and booked clients and students for clinical hours. Dina, fluent in English, acted as interpreter for Marion and because of this amassed many more clinical hours than other students. In addition, she is a talented and insightful woman, has a natural gift for homeopathy, and possesses an innate gentleness and goodness. The plants and rare orchards in her clinic thrive under her care.

It was Dina's drive and inspiration to carry on the clinic after Marion left Sarajevo. She offered, with a former colleague, supervision and bi-monthly meetings to other practicing homeopaths and homeopaths with less clinical experience and confidence. Still she leaves her clinic open for bi-monthly meetings.

Dina is on the executive board of the Sarajevo Society of Homeopaths, and is working for more cohesiveness amongst Bosnian homeopaths and the availability of more post graduate opportunities for practitioners both in study and work.

Each post graduate seminar Dina attends, she carefully translates from English into Bosnian for all homeopaths who cannot attend. Her own practice is a family practice, when it can be, treating all family members when there is evidence of traumatic symptoms. She reaches out to the community at large, in her dilapidated car, driving to the ill and shut in to treat them. She has worked with the dying, giving them special care both in her efforts to keep them alive and to see them out. She is wanting to work in villages outside of Sarajevo where there is limited medical care, and in existing programs for children.

Dina created private practice with no financial resources, save for remedies donated by Marion Howie. She does not have a reference library of her own, though for a limited time she is watching over the Homeopathic Society's small library. With limited remedies and her Materia Medicas and other desk-top references she has been a devoted practitioner and guardian of the clinic's existence. About 60 percent of her clients she now treats for free. This leaves her little money for clinic expenses, remedies, books, and almost nothing for her personal needs. Until now, she has been also supported by certain friends who believe in her work, but this cannot continue.

It is Dina's hope, and I am her ally or partner in this effort, to create a complimentary care NGO, employing at first two homeopaths, eventually three or more, and one or two healing arts practitioners from other holistic disciplines. The clinic will move to the oldest part of Sarajevo and become a neighborhood family clinic which will be part of a broader educational program for children and families.

It will take several months to register this program as an NGO, It will have as an umbrella the non profit US organization the US. Metta Trust or Loving Kindness Trust, so in time US tax payers will be able to receive tax benefits for contributions. Too, a branch of Metta may be established in Scotland. But, at this point, all of this is at a distance.

In the meantime, there are very real emergency needs. Dina must have the equivalent to a years rent plus utilities to stay within her clinic in order to sign a contract for that time or leave her clinic. She also needs remedies for her practice, a reliable car, a laptop computer so that she can ease her work which is all done in long hand. She needs gasoline for travel to patients within Sarajevo and to villages. Email would open her expand her network of support. She needs some minimum funds for her private needs.

Dina is hoping another homeopath will join her soon in her practice. The two will give strength to one another in the clinic's struggle for survival and hope for its expansion.

Dina would like to create with her colleagues some monographs of remedy profiles especially useful in post war countries And also, over time she would like to translate with the help of colleagues some texts, such as Organon ,which have not been translated into Serbo Croatian and this would be another long term efforts, comparing not only to the English translation but, with Dina's fluency in German, the original German.

Homeopath to Homeopath

We are beginning a friendship network in which Homeopaths, and other healing arts therapists, abroad may contribute to the survival and expansion of Dina's clinic, both through the donation of funds, donations of remedies and books, exchange of ideas, telling other complimentary practitioners of our existence, visiting our clinic, volunteering time in future treatment programs, giving advanced training or supervision, and general friendship and spiritual support.

Together, over the next year, we must raise a minimum of about \$25,000 which would employ a second homeopath, and perhaps one other holistic practitioner , provide some kind of living wage, buy several computers and a decent used car. Pay clinic expenses, as well as the cost of a renting a bi-monthly space in a village, gasoline, and general expenses. host public talks and educational seminars, print educational material for clients. Create regular supervision sessions.

By the second year we would like to raise \$60,000 - \$70,000 to purchase a building or flat and add another homeopath and one other complimentary therapist.

For those who become contributing friends we will send reports on our activities as they grow and uses of monies received.
